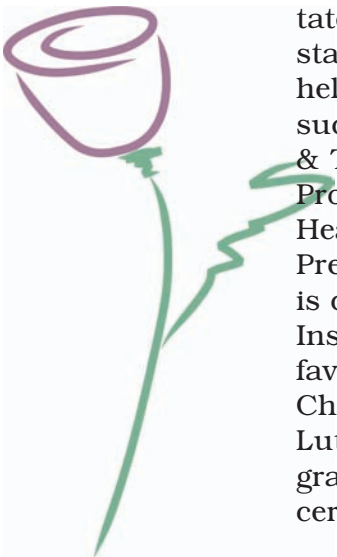
Health/Wellness Promotion, Training & Development, Human Resource Management, and Organizational Development.

Mites that Matter

Stories about how your mites make a difference.

Saudi artist Bader Hamoud ignored attempts by his family to keep him from converting to Christianity. In sharp contrast to most Muslim converts who must remain anonymous, once Bader came to faith he announced his conversion on Saudi television saying, "The Christian religion calls for love and tolerance". He also convinced his wife, who is a resident of Kuwait and Syria.

(K) is another Muslim convert who received Jesus as his Lord after working for 3 months over the telephone with Rev. Naeem. Fearing for his life, other Christians helped him flee to China. He established a new mission to Arabic speaking people there, and 17 people are now on their way to believing in Jesus.

Although their families are entirely Muslim, two women (G) and (S) have also come to faith in Christ. They are both highly educated, which is very unusual in Saudi Arabia. These ladies are fluent in English and hoping for an opportunity to work in the USA witnessing to other Saudis.

Biblical Orthodox Lutheran Mission (BOLM) is changing the way the Arabic people think about Lutheran theology. 97% of the area had not heard Lutheran theology, and some considered it a cult. BOLM is breaking down barriers and making Lutheranism very well known among Arabs and Muslims.

The Gospel, shared by Christians who present the message of God's love, are freeing the people of the Middle East from the enslavement of wrong beliefs. The Arabic believers have been very instrumental in advancing the mission by helping the missionaries and the new converts. They are ready and eager to help share the good news!

Despite persecution, threats of death, and rejection by family members, regular contact with Christian teachers through the efforts of the Biblical Orthodox Lutheran Mission (BOLM) allow Muslims to learn about Christ and come to Him in faith. Arabic speaking people connect with each other in internet classrooms to learn English or Christian teaching from preachers and teachers.

Mites help bring the Gospel message and hope to people in the Middle East. BOLM is one of the mission projects that has been fully funded. Our grant money enables Dr. Naeem to teach and share the gospel with Arabic speaking people using new technologies and equipment.

Lutheran Women Adopt \$1.825 Million Mission Goal

Delegates to the 33rd Biennial Convention of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) adopted a \$1.825 million mission goal for the 2009–11 biennium. It is the largest in the organization's 67-year history and will fund a record 19 mission grants. The funds raised nationwide over the next two years will be used to support the following mission grants:

- Defray Costs of Shipping Quilts by Lutheran World Relief – \$80,000
- Concordia Seminary, St. Louis Food Bank Relocation – \$50,000
- The Carpenter's Hands – Youth Refurbish Homes in Florida – \$26,000
- Psalm 69:14 Project – Emergency Disaster Aid in Texas, Oklahoma, & Louisiana – \$50,000
- Digitize Classes for Specific Ministry Pastor Program, Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Indiana – \$36,000
- 10 Chapels, Transportation, and Pastoral Training in Tanzania – \$88,000
- Body and Soul Care for Children in India – \$50,000
- LCMS Prison Ministry Provides Devotional Materials – \$50,000
- Lutheran Braille Workers Provide English Braille Bibles – Africa – \$100,000
- Kyrgyzstan Locals Trained for Evangelism - \$100,000
- The Hope Center for Refugees and Immigrants – Ohio – \$90,000
- Human Care & Pastoral Ministries Developed in Latvia & Lithuania – \$87,500
- Mission Support to Disabled Children – Dominican Republic – \$50,000

The church, Christ Lutheran Church for the Deaf, had just torn down the rectory, to build an outreach center so volunteer efforts from the church and community were directed toward that effort. so we focused on helping with some cleaning, painting, and file organizing in the church itself.

Thursday afternoon was spent removing green boards from walls and masking in preparation for painting of two bathrooms and the basement of Christ Church on Friday and Saturday morning. On Saturday painting the kitchen was included in the tasks as well as painting a couple storage rooms. While the last of the paint was being applied, the team was busy mopping the basement floor and restoring the basement furnishing to their proper places.

Barb, our resident gardener, weeded flower beds, dug up hostas and replanted them around the church. We kept asking her if she needed help but she was in her element enjoying the beautiful weather while the rest of us barely saw the sun.

One of the reasons the cost for the trip was very reasonable was due to the hospitality of five LWML families in Jacksonville. Diane contacted Carol Schmidt from Our Redeemer who sent out a request for families who would house us instead of paying the cost of three nights at a hotel. This was especially gracious of these ladies since their CID(Central Illinois District)-LWML convention was the Friday evening and Saturday of our trip.

also reduced the cost. Easy, quick and effortless meals supplied us with the energy needed to complete our tasks. We splurged on Saturday evening and had great pizza from Pastor Tom's favorite place. Sunday we enjoyed lunch at Applebee's before heading for home.

Emma, Susie's daughter, provided teenage youth and energy to our team. Her greatest joys included mopping floors with Carol Fuys, painting the girls' bathroom pepto-bismol pink and being part of the ice cream social with the deaf residents on Saturday evening.

Following ice cream and brownies Susie had everyone making "stained glass" fish which our guests had a great time assembling after we finally got the backing removed from the clear contact paper onto which the "glass" pieces were stuck. The evening's program concluded with Susie reading and Pastor Tom signing The Friends Go Fishing.

The vastness of the mission field there is among the deaf was related to us by Pastor Tom. Between 95-98% of the deaf population is unchurched but the opportunities in the LCMS for working among the deaf have decreased greatly during the past 20 years as the number of professional church workers among the deaf has decreased from about 60 to only 16 today.

Thanking us Pastor Tom stated "We were humbled by this team of ladies who came at their own expense and did so many tasks that we knew we would never have finished on our own." On Sunday morning he told us that "pound for pound we were the hardest workers to have visited them!" That statement was a compliment. Our members were inspired by their example and are eager to bring the Gospel to the deaf of central Illinois. Thanks ladies of the NID!"
