Here Am I! Send Me.

"Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" (Isaiah 6:8a) asked the voice of the Lord. Isaiah replied that he would go. His job was to tell the people of Israel all the sins they had done and the result of their forsaking the Lord.

As Lutheran Women in Mission, we have an easier task—we joyfully proclaim Christ, support missions, and equip women to honor God by serving others. There

are many ways we can serve others. It could mean planning to host a zone meeting or becoming a local, zone, or district officer or serving on a district committee. Our prayer for the 2022-2024 biennium needs to be that we, as Women in Mission, will be equipped to serve our Lord when asked.

In October several of our ladies and our new pastoral counselor will be going to St Louis for the Assembly of Leaders (AOL) event which is held every four years. One of the commitments made is to share the knowledge from AOL with the women of the district. Four years ago we were planning to hold a meeting in each of the regions of the district to share the information but then the pandemic occurred.

Ladies who have been asked to serve in an elected position by members of the nominating committee expressed a lack of knowledge to serve. The objective of AOL and the VP of Organizational Resources is to provide information needed to serve locally, in your zone, or at the district level. What will your answer be when the ladies who attend AOL ask you to join as they share their knowledge with the officers at the local and zone level? Will you say, "Here am I, I will attend?"

Two Promises



Rev. Jeffrey P. Howell Pastor St. Paul Lutheran Church —Grand Crossing Chicago, IL John 16:33 — "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world." (ESV)

In this passage, our Lord makes two promises to His disciples. His first promise is, *"In the world you will have tribulations."* "You will." Jesus did not say, "You might, you could, or maybe you will." He did not say, "they go away if you follow me." He says, "You will have." No could, no might, or maybe, but "will." And we will have what? **Tribulations**. This is not a very comforting promise! But during these tribulations, we are confident that God has not abandoned us. It means that our tribulations have not caught Him unaware, or that it has escaped His attention. It is in the experience of this promise that we are driven toward the second one.

Jesus says, "But take heart; I have overcome the world." It would be arrogant if someone other than our Savior was making this statement. He says, "I have." Jesus says this before Easter, not after. Even before Jesus rose from the dead, He had already overcome the world. The cross was not failure, but triumph. It was not the end, but the beginning. His resurrection proves His reign over the world that opposes Him. It stamps His victory against the world that hates Him and us, that cannot


give the peace He gives, that rejoiced over the disciples' sorrow and pain. But the ruler of this world is judged and defeated. By faith, we are chosen out of this world.

Our Lord has overcome the world. What does that mean for us? What does that mean for our tribulations? It means that His victory over our tribulations has already been completed, even before we finish enduring them, not just after! We can face them with faith and courage for His resurrection is the confirmation of this victory and promise. He is with us. We can truly take heart because He has truly overcome the world. That is comforting!

It has been an honor to serve as Pastoral Counselor. I have been inspired and benefited from my time with this group. My prayer is that the Holy Spirit keep you strong and endure all that will come your way. May our Lord be with you as you serve His kingdom! Amen!

A Fool and His Monet by Sandra Orchard

(Revell, 2016)

I had fun following the clues with Serena as she sought the art thief! Did you solve the mystery before Serena? I didn't. I had a suspect in mind about one third of the way into the book, but I was incorrect! Oh, well.

Serena's (sometimes eccentric) band of friends and family are fantastic. I loved that despite Serena being the professional FBI agent, she got help



solving her case from some unexpected sources. (Thank you, Aunt Martha!) She also had plenty of protectors along the way. I laughed aloud when an unrequested guardian misidentified friend as foe for the second time. Poor Jax (and Nate).

Serena herself is an interesting character. She has the skills needed to do her job, but harbors some doubts about her own readiness. Yes, she's new to the Art Crime Team, but she caught her thief, which she told us is unusual in art thefts. I thought her claustrophobia would play a bigger role in the story, but maybe that will come up in a later book. (If you do want to read more about Serena Jones, book two is called *Another Day, Another Dali*.)

I'm glad that her mother warmed to Serena's profession. Even in a novel meant purely for entertainment, we can be reminded of fundamental principles. Most parents have an idea of how they'd like their children's lives to go. Sometimes those plans align with actuality, but many times they don't. When they don't align, parents should recognize that their children have been called to a vocation, as June Jones does. June didn't say it in so many words, but we know that she has accepted Serena's calling, complete with its dangers and lack of grandchildren thus far (though June is definitely still rooting for grandchildren).

The villain's motive was interesting. I don't know that I've ever read a story where the antagonist's goal is to prove a point. Now, I know that proving said point was supposed to result in the fulfillment of a more standard desire, but it's still an interesting motivator. (Yes, I am being very vague. I don't want to utterly spoil the ending. This is a mystery after all!)

A Spring Tea to Remember

The Immanuel, Mokena, ladies outdid themselves. Their goal was to collect and fill 80 purses with toiletries for the Crisis Center of South Suburbia. Hold onto your hats—as they actually collected over 150 purses and filled to the brim a total of 101 purses!

On a beautiful spring Sunday afternoon, 42 women attended the Tea. Pretty pink tablecloths with flowered

teapot centerpieces greeted them as they entered the narthex. They were then ushered into the sanctuary to hear a presentation from Lorri Nagle, Director of Development at the Crisis Center. Lorri educated the guests with facts and data about domestic violence and shared the many programs offered by the Center.



After the presentation, a luncheon of tiny sandwiches was prepared, along with a fruit cup, cookies and of course, TEA! Each woman brought their own teacup to brew their own favorite blend of tea!

Next came the fun part of the afternoon—the women filled their donated purses with at least 25 different kinds of toiletries—the purses were bulging. Altogether, 58 purses were filled at the Spring Tea. Added to that amount were 43 purses filled by God's Kids Club, for a total of 101 purses. The unfilled leftover purses were donated to Neat Repeats, a resale shop supporting the Crisis Center.

The event was a smashing tribute to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League!

Several months ago, our LWML meeting welcomed a member from a neighboring community that informed us about the Days for Girls ministry. I had learned of this mission at a District Convention, so was anxious to get "the rest of the story." Living in a community where we can find most anything we want on a store shelf or with a click through Amazon, it is hard to comprehend that girls lack the most basic supplies when it comes to feminine hygiene. As the need was presented, our group began to buzz with enthusiasm. Our "Mama Bear" instinct was released big time as we envisioned how these girls were shunned and shamed for a week each month.

We set a time to meet with Margaret Studer, who leads this ministry in her church. She is an amazing and patient teacher! We were invited to her home to sew multiple times so she could walk us through each step of the process. She armed us with binders of step-by-step instructions and the assurance that we could ask her anything!

With this being LWML's 80th year, we set our goal to make 80 kits. Watching the reality of that goal unfold was, at times, overwhelming and discouraging. The devil worked hard to instill doubt and obstacles before us, but armed with prayer and love for the recipients, we forged on.

Two mass sewing days were scheduled to take place in our church fellowship hall. We are blessed to have two teachers on our committee that know how to organize! As the sewers and non-sewers arrived for their chosen "shift," the room began to whir with excited energy. The doubt that we would not be able to produce high-quality kits was quickly replaced with loving stitches that completed task after task. Teenage girls joined in to help with the ironing, measuring, stringing the bags with ribbons, and helping wherever they could. It was delightful to have their chatter and enthusiasm fueling the efforts.

By the end of the second sewing day, the kits were not completed, but we look forward with joyful anticipation to another stitching get-together to finish our kits and send them off—packed with love and prayers. It is evident that God had a perfect plan for this project. Aside from the recipients who will be blessed with the kits, new friendships were formed as the irons steamed and the machines hummed. Seam rippers armed us with humility and laughter. When we truly devote ourselves to "Serve the Lord with gladness," He will provide the way far beyond anything we can imagine!
