## 2022-2024 NID Mission Grants

The delegates to the LWML NID Convention last September voted to approve the proposed mite goal of \$160,000. \$98,000 will fund our district's grants. This goal, if met, along with a \$1,000 transfer from last biennium's surplus, will allow us to fully fund nine mission grants!

#### Concordia Seminary—St. Louis—Increasing Student Enrollment

\$8,000

Concordia Seminary asked for a mission grant to help them address The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's (LCMS) considerable pastor shortage that is jeopardizing faithful pastoral care to church members.

#### Northern Illinois District Life Task Force: Spreading the Gospel of Life \$9,000

The grant will enable the Life Task Force to offer more, and affordable, opportunities within each region of the Northern Illinois District to educate many more people on Life Issues and empower them to take up the Christian cause for life in Illinois.

#### **Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch**

\$4,000

The gift from the Northern Illinois District will be used as part of a larger project to transform the Kruse Memorial Chapel, creating a more trauma-sensitive, child-friendly environment that engages at-risk children, facilitating growth in the Gospel and Christ-centered healing.

#### **Lutheran Bible Translators**

\$15,000

The majority of the Subula people of Cameroon are Muslims. The Subula people are eager for a revised version of the New Testament and for the Old Testament to be translated. Lutheran Bible Translators requested \$15,000 to translate fifteen chapters of Scripture to put God's Word in the hands of the Subula people.

Walcamp \$18,000

Walcamp's pavilion is used by many of their programs, as well as many user groups. A few local congregations utilize this area for Vacation Bible School, while another uses the area for a large congregation camp out. They are planning on adding a serving kitchen to the structure.

MOST Ministries \$8,000

MOST Ministries enables committed Christians to go on short-term missions and share God's love through both witness and acts of service. This grant will enable MOST Ministries to cover the cost of attending the Team Leader Training Orientation and one Team Leader Retreat for four Team Leader Trainees who begin their training in 2023 and 2024 (four Team Leader Trainees in each year).

#### **Trinity Lutheran Church and School of Tinley Park**

\$10,668.90

Trinity Lutheran School is remodeling a room to be a "maker space" with building and crafting material storage along the walls. They will purchase new technological learning materials, and open up the room so students can collaborate together and explore the world God created.

LINC Chicago \$16,340

LINC's goal is to find leaders in Chicago neighborhoods with God-given dreams who want to impact their communities with the Gospel and to raise up the next generation of church planters, multi-ethnic leaders, and urban missionaries. Funding will enable them to continue to engage, equip, and empower current LINC leaders as well as leaders yet to be recruited.

Voice of Care \$10,000

Voice of Care will provide a district-wide high-level Respite and Companion Care Training program for church workers and lay volunteers. They are poised to train 175 individuals to provide much-needed qualified short term respite care to families and individuals.

## NID-Bits Book Club — The End of the Magi

#### The End of the Magi

by Patrick W. Carr (Bethany House, 2019)

I enjoyed this imagining of the magi's journey to worship Jesus. I tend to think that the real magi's trip was less perilous, as they were hopefully not being pursued, but it made for an exciting book plot! I also liked the idea, even if it is pure supposition, that the magi who visited the child Jesus could have witnessed the events of Holy Week and Pentecost.



There were a few instances when the story failed to align with the truth of the biblical account, such as having Herod not know they were going to Bethlehem (he's the one who told them to go there) and having the magi warn Joseph to flee (he was warned by an angel.) It also seems unlikely that the gifts presented to Jesus would have been bought with stolen funds. Overall, though, I appreciated seeing the Christmas and Easter stories play out through the eyes of those lacking the benefit of scriptural hindsight.

There have been times when I have wondered—unfairly—how the disciples and others didn't catch on to fact that Jesus had to die. *The End of the Magi* does a good job of examining how the Old Testament prophecies are not nearly so clear without the benefit of seeing them—seeming contradictions and all—fulfilled in Jesus. For instance, how could the Messiah both be "cut off" and reign over His kingdom? It helps to know that His is not an earthly kingdom!

Along similar lines, this story reminded me to be grateful for the blessing of having easy access to Scripture. Whereas I have limitless access to the Bible at home, at church, and even at the library, there were first-century synagogues that lacked a complete Tanakh (Old Testament). Esai brought Walagash into the profitable silk trade in exchange for a Torah—only the first five books of the Bible! For decades Myrad kept the calendar without knowing the rest of the Messianic prophecies. It's hard for me to fathom how limiting a lack of access to Scripture would be.

A theme woven throughout *The End of the Magi* is that God's plans do not always align with human expectations. Of course, this comes through in the characters' surprise about Jesus's life, but Myrad says this in regards to himself: "It's almost as if God takes delight in accomplishing His ends in the most unlikely way possible." (p. 313) By human reasoning, Myrad shouldn't have played any role in the magi's journey, but God put him right in the thick of things! The same could be said of Myrad and Roshan's personal lives. No one would have expected the disabled son of a melon seller to marry into a family of silk merchants, but God brought them together, and decades later Myrad will use his travels and connections to spread the Good News of Jesus.

Thank you for joining the NID-Bits Book Club! I hope that you (and your book buddies) enjoyed *The End of the Magi* and will continue to follow along on our bookish adventures.

## Society Spotlight: Women of Faith Lake Forest


In this issue, we are highlighting some of the many 2022 activities of the Women of Faith group. Thank you to Jan B. for sharing all of the goings-on at Faith Lake Forest!

Last April saw the resumption of Women of Faith's monthly meetings. They started their morning discussing *A Shepherd Looks at Psalm 23* by W. Phillip Keller, then enjoyed lunch. They finished the meeting with a service project: archiving decades of photographs from the LWML NID Archive.

The Tuesday Tie-ers resumed meeting twice per month to make tied quilts for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). LWR sends these tangible messages of care to people affected by natural disasters throughout the world.

Women's Ministry celebrated Mother's Day by presenting each woman who attended services that weekend with a beautifully scented handmade sachet, in recognition of her faith and service.

In June Women of Faith enjoyed an evening of fellowship and service as they created framed art for Faith's Members-to-Visit (homebound members). As part of the festivities, the ladies performed a laying-on-of-hands blessing for one of their members in preparation for her mission trip to Acuña, Mexico, with Casas por Cristo. They also



presented her with a guilt to be given to the family for whom she helped build a house.

Assisting with the creation of the art were the ladies of Faith's Mailbox Members service team. Like all congregations, Faith has a number of women who feel called to serve, but have limited ability to be away from their homes. In response, Women's Ministry organizers have invited those ladies to join Faith's Mailbox Members service team. Team members are provided with all of the supplies and instructions needed to complete service projects from the comfort of their homes, as their schedules permit.

Arlene, one of Faith's members, along with her husband, Dick, repurposes each week's altar flowers into bouquets for those Members-to-Visit who are having birthdays.

In March one of Faith's members, Cheryl, met with students from North Chicago Community High School as part of a career Q&A presented by Faith at the high school. She told them about her diverse nursing career, having served in a hospital, clinics, and a nursing home. "Nursing is about people." She encouraged them that while nursing requires some schooling, especially in the sciences, it doesn't require perfect grades, and that there are grants and loans available to those who "go and look for it."

If your group is looking for new ideas, we hope that these events inspire you!
