President's Message

Greetings, Northern Illinois District Lutheran Women In Mission:

Prayer is what the Holy Spirit put on my heart to write about for this NID-Bits issue. I am a strong believer in the power of prayer. I have felt the effects of being covered with prayer throughout the first two years as your LWML NID president. I know that MANY have been praying for me when I have been sick and injured (which has happened multiple times in the last two years), prayers for my strength in caring for my aging parents, and especially prayer offered up for me at the passing of my dad. I am so thankful for those prayers.

Prayer. I have listened to podcasts about prayer and read many devotions addressing prayer. We know why we pray; it's our communication with Jesus. We have been taught to use the ACTS format: Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication, which is a great guideline. Of course, the Lord's Prayer that Jesus taught us is the best prayer to recite. I know of prayer warriors who faithfully pray. I admit, I struggle with my prayer life. Do I pray enough? Probably not. I admire someone who can pray a beautifully worded prayer. But one thing I learned in my research is to ask the Holy Spirit to be present when you begin to pray. I also learned we have a so-called 'spell check' when we end our prayer with "In Jesus's name we pray."

I found in our LWML resources a devotion by Alma Kern about prayer that says it best. I am glad we have these resources on the lwml.org website available to us.

Open Your Life to God

Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need (Hebrews 4:16).

Why pray? God knows everything.

True! "... your Father knows what you need before you ask him" (Matthew 6:8b).
Prayer is not informing God of what's going on.
The Almighty is not waiting for us to give Him directions.

Proper prayer does not try to manipulate God. It is not an attempt to bring Him under our control. It is not demanding God's help but making ourselves more receptive to His power. The real essence of prayer is the opening of our lives to the influence of the living Lord. It is lining up our will with His. It's discovering what we really need.

Prayer is drawing nearer to God, Seeking to commune with the Eternal One. For this reason, prayer goes far beyond petition. It is a blend also of thanksgiving, praise meditation, and confession. The more we pray, the closer we feel to God. The closer we draw to Him, the more we are inclined to pray. Faith gives us the confidence to pray. Prayer exercises faith.

The stronger our faith in the Lord, the more we rely on His goodness and greatness.

God's answers to prayer are not the only benefits. Even in asking, a need is filled and we arise strengthened and repaired.

The seeking, the asking, the knocking Are part of the blessing.

They remind us of our dependence on God and make His presence more real.

Prayer can be a frantic outburst of supplication. It is also calm, candid conversation.

On occasion God's answers to prayer are so dramatic we call them miracles.
But a constant, quiet miracle takes place in our hearts as we discover that in answer to prayer, God supplies a steady flow of power for ordinary daily living.
In opening ourselves to God's power,

we not only survive, we thrive! **Prayer:** Dear Lord, strengthen my prayer life. In Jesus's name. Amen.

You Never Know How God Will Use Your Witness

One of the two who heard John speak and followed Jesus was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his own brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which means Christ). (John 1:40-41)

You can imagine the excitement in Andrew's voice as he speaks to his brother. "We have found the Messiah!" (John 1:41) While Andrew was the one to bring the message of the Messiah to his brother Peter, after this event, Andrew kind of just fades into the background. We really do not get to know much more about him versus his much more famous brother, Peter. Andrew was not a part of the inner circle of the 12—Peter, James, and John. He is not at the Mount of Transfiguration. He is not in the Garden of Gethsemane. And if we went by how much we see him in Scripture, he doesn't seem to be that important of a disciple. But in fact he is. Andrew brought the message of the Messiah to one of the twelve—his brother Peter. In this act, Andrew is a model disciple. Andrew is not relying on signs or wonders; he just tells his brother, "we have found the Messiah." Andrew uses his relationship with his brother Peter to tell him the life-changing message of Jesus: Lamb of God has come to take away the sins of the world. (John 1:29)

Lutheran Women in Mission are given opportunities to tell others about Jesus. We come to faith exactly the same way Andrew, Peter, and the rest of the disciples did—through hearing. Faith comes through hearing and hearing through the Word of God. (Romans 10:7) Be like Andrew. Everyone here has relationships in which God has put you to tell the good news of Jesus. Andrew just simply tells his brother, "We found the Messiah." Notice he doesn't get into an argument or into a philosophical debate, he just does it. Just tell others about Jesus. God will give you opportunities to bring his life-saving message in the midst of this dark world. Isaiah writes, "So shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it." (Isaiah 55:11)

You do not know what seeds you plant in a person's life when you tell them about Jesus. Andrew got to see the response immediately. For us, we may never see the results of God's Word working in peoples' hearts. Andrew fading into the background shows us this: it wasn't about Andrew—it is not about us. It is all about Jesus. It is all about what Jesus has done for Andrew, Peter, and us. Jesus changed Andrew's life so much so Andrew needed to share it with Peter. Andrew needed to tell Peter—to tell us—that the Lamb of God has come to take away all of our sins. When we experience the forgiveness of sins, how can we just bottle it up? No, we can't just bottle the message up, we speak out of the abundance of our hearts; we want to shout it from the mountaintops because Jesus is the greatest gift God the Father has given to us.

Through the shedding of the blood of this lamb we are bought and purchased back from all of our sins, death, and the power of the Devil. This is good news. This changes our lives. This motivates us to share this good news with others just as Andrew did. *Lamb of God has come to take away the sins of the world.* Your sin, my sin, so that not even death reigns over us anymore. Through their mites, talents, and time, Lutheran Women in Mission share this message just as Andrew shared it with his brother, Peter, who later became the prince of the apostles. You never know what kind of impact your witness will bring to others in God's time. Amen.

However, I need more women to come alongside me and the Heart to Heart Sisters/Cross Cultural committee which is underneath me. One immediate activity that needs a sub-committee is a group of women to undertake our Gifts from the Heart program, the in-gatherings we do at district-level functions. Another is to make phone calls to zone presidents to find out if there are any special concerns or populations within their societies. We need to know what needs are out there before we can provide resources. If your society has people with special needs, such as hearing or visual impairments, mobility issues, or emotional/cognitive/mental health disabilities, please email me or call because we have resources immediately available for your group.

I hope to find direction from the LWML at large and specifically at the 2025 Convention in Omaha, so there will be a huge update in a few months!

2024-2026 LWML NID Mission Grants

The delegates to the LWML NID Convention voted to fund the following grants with our mites during the 2024-2026 biennium. Watch a <u>video about the grants</u> on the LWML NID YouTube channel (https://www.youtube.com/@lwmlnid7730). The grants are listed in order of votes received.

Concordia Theological Seminary Ft. Wayne Food Co-op

\$10,000

The Food Co-op of CTSFW provides up to 85% of our student families' monthly grocery needs at no cost to them. We operate as an actual cooperative, where each family volunteers time monthly to receive points used to purchase grocery items. The Co-op spends approximately \$7,000 a month on fresh produce, eggs, milk, cheese, ground beef, and other grocery items to fill in the shelves. Many of our students say use of the Co-op has taken away the concern of how they will feed their family. Thank you for caring for the men and women who have answered God's call to serve Him and you.

Phil's Friends Ministry Expansion

\$18,000

After much prayer, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Kankakee, will be partnering with Phil's Friends to turn their former school building into a new Phil's Friends Hope Center. The center will provide Christ-centered support and hope to those affected by cancer. The building, empty for most of the past 15 years, needs ministry-essential updates to prepare a friendly and hope-generating space for volunteers to share the love of Jesus. This \$18,000 grant would provide building updates, furniture, and equipment for St. Paul's preparations for the new Hope Center.

Lutheran Heritage Foundation

\$15,000

Sharing Lutheran Bible books in a Muslim school—does it sound impossible? With God, all things are possible! In Indonesia (home to the world's largest Muslim population), their founders admired diversity, and so the country does not proclaim itself an Islamic State. This pride in diversity and a certain amount of tolerance allow for the teaching of different world religions in Indonesia's public schools, where Christians can teach the basics of the faith. At a cost of only \$5 per book, we can provide 3,000 colorful Bible storybooks and Small Catechisms in the Indonesian language for Indonesia's public school students.

Dr. Rev. William and Ella Mae Griffin Community Center Food Pantry \$18,000

Dr. Rev. William and Ella Mae Griffin Community Center, a ministry of Zion Lutheran Church, Chicago, opened in 2008 to meet the community's needs and serve as a bridge for Gospel outreach. The Center continues to serve over 300 individuals monthly through its weekly food pantry, clothing bank, and outreach events organized throughout the year. Over the past fifteen years, we have remained faithful to the mission of fighting hunger. By helping to close the gap between our community's need for donated food and the amount of food available through collaborative efforts, it's our mission to impact hundreds of families yearly.

Food for Thought—Feeding More Children in Belize

\$18,000

By extending our Mercy outreach, our grant focuses on the transformative impact of sharing Jesus' love through hot, nutritious meals for children in Georgetown, Belize. Operating our second feeding program, hosted by a local resident, we currently serve 22 elementary students. However, the school principal identifies a pressing need for over 50 participants. Expanding our program aligns with our commitment to Christ Lutheran Church and aims to address the substantial need for nutritional support among elementary school students in Georgetown, Belize.

Worship Anew \$18,000

Although overall church attendance has decreased amongst aging adults, the population reached by Worship Anew is growing rapidly each year. With support from the Lutheran Women's Missionary League of the Northern Illinois District, Worship Anew seeks to continue broadcasting our weekly, 30-minute worship program in current markets and expand into new markets, reaching thousands with the life-changing Gospel message. Our broadcast faithfully and boldly proclaims the Gospel through Scripture readings, the Lord's Prayer, the Apostles' Creed, hymns, and a sermon preached by an ordained LCMS Pastor. As a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS, Worship Anew shares correct Biblical doctrine as presented in the Lutheran Confessions.

St. John's Lutheran Church, La Grange

\$10,400

St. John's has expanded our VBS outreach to multiple events per year—summer, winter, and spring. We minister to as many as 200 children per event, more than 80% of whom come from surrounding communities, and many with no knowledge of Jesus. We present Bibles as gifts to children who have no other access to God's Word and send their families weekly email Bible lessons following VBS. This year we are establishing a weekly outreach event for families, a fun evening of activities along with Bible lessons for all ages. We will walk our neighborhood with invitations and advertise on multiple venues. As we grow our program, the Holy Spirit grows faith from these planted seeds!
